Happy Retirement to Town Payroll Clerk



Town of Perinton Finance Director Brian Dick feels good about his job the moment he walks into his office every day.

"The first person I see is Joan Rainis," Dick said. "How can you not feel good about things when

you see Joan? She makes you feel so welcome. You know she will bend over backwards to do things for people all day."

Rainis and her ear-to-ear smile retired as Town Payroll Clerk on April 29 after 20 years on the job at Town Hall.

"Joan is the heart and soul of the finance department," Dick said. "Our staff from the highway department or the parks department will come in the office and if Joan isn't here, they will say 'I'll come back.' We can't replace Joan; not the way she does her work."

Rainis, who husband Ken has been on the Perinton Conservation Board for more than 30 years, plans to spend the first month of retirement visiting her son Michael, his wife, and his 5 sons in Spokane, Washington, Rainis' daughter Caroline lives in Penfield with her husband and Joan's other two grandchildren, a boy and a girl.

"It will be bittersweet to leave," Rainis said. "I'm so used to coming in and trying to do a good job, that it will be really different not to think about it. But it is time for Joan to be a grandmother."

Rainis grew up on the South side of Chicago where she met Ken. They moved to lowa while Ken worked on his Master's Degree. She also had her first son Billy while in Iowa.

In August of 1976, they moved to Rochester. Joan worked various jobs, including 9 months in the Town Clerk's office in Brighton and 5 years as the financial administrator for North Baptist Christian School in Irondequoit before coming to work for the town of Perinton. The couple had moved to Perinton in 1986.

"The best part is the people," Joan said. "I love working with numbers, but also taking care of our staff and making sure they have no concerns about their pay. I took pride in making sure payroll was correct and retirements and health care were all set. I liked keeping a close eve on things for our staff."

Besides being a grandmother, Joan plans to spend more time as a Minister. She has taught Sunday School for many years at Grace Baptist Church in Marion.

"We will certainly miss Joan around here," said Perinton Town Supervisor Ciaran Hanna. "She is a terrific worker and is a pleasure to be around. I wish her the best and I know she will enjoy spending more time with her grandchildren."

"Joanie was always in a good mood," said Town Community Service Coordinator Barb Clay, who worked with Joan for 20 years. "She was always a good listener and a good friend. She was true, loyal, and funny with all her Joanieisms."

The *Air National Guard Band* of the Northeast will kick off the concert season at Center Park Amphitheater Monday, July 1 at 7 p.m.

The band is the premiere military band from within the Pennsylvania Air National Guard. The band, which has played throughout the United States and abroad, features a variety of classical, jazz, popular music, marches, patriotic favorites and show tunes arranged for the concert band and other small ensembles.

The band, which originally formed in 1942, is a 100% traditional Air National Guard squadron, with all 40 members having civilian careers, and meeting one weekend a month to rehearse and perform.



Keys to the Caddy highlight their 13th year as a band when they play Center Stage at Center Park Sunday, August 4 as part of the Summer Sunday Concert Series at the Patricia S. Knapp Amphitheater in Perinton.

The band includes five former members of the original *Nik & the Nice Guys* band from the 1980's. Two Fairport natives – Brian Venton and Randy Stuckless – have played together for more than 40 years starting with a band they had in high school called Autumn Skies.

"For me it's exciting," said band member Tony Infantino, who is an on-air personality for WARM 101.3. "I've wanted to play the Amphitheater for some time, so this is a thrill!"

Former Nice Guy Infantino knew he wanted to get back on stage and knew the only people he wanted to do it with were the guys he traveled the country with making great music. The Keys play every kind of music except opera, with a focus on classic rock, blues and a little country. The Keys will be bringing their horn section, *The El Dorado Horns*, for the Perinton show.

The annual concert series, sponsored by **Wegmans**, plays from 6-8 p.m. Sunday evenings starting July 7 through Sept. 8. The Fairport Lion's Club runs concessions along with Casa Larga Vineyards, Lugia's Ice Cream and various food trucks. The concerts are free, but donations to the Perinton Food Shelf are accepted every

week.

The *Old Hippies* (July 28) are another band new to the concert series this year. The band includes Bill McDonald, Kay McDonald, Vinny Pastore, Jim Catino, and Jim Sweet.

The band's music is acoustic and a varied brand, be it their own creative songs or recognizable covers from a golden music era: the 50s, 60s, 70s and so on. For more on the band, check out their Facebook Page: https://www.facebook.com/oldhippiesmusic/

The *Breakfast Club* (July 21) is an 80s tribute band that covers all genres of the era (pop, rock, new wave etc). The band, which formed on 2016, covers artists such as Bon Jovi, Madonna, Huey Lewis, Cyndi Lauper, Van Halen and others.

"We are really looking forward to playing the Perinton Concert Series this summer," said band member Bill Eberts.

Eberts said the band has been playing clubs, casinos, festivals and private events. The band includes Janine Eberts (lead vocals), Michael Cantatore (lead vocals), Dave Carroll (guiter/backing vocals), Chad Weisensel (keyboards/backing vocals), Bill Eberts (drums/backing vocals), and Brian Eberts (bass).

The 2019 Gazebo Concert Series kicks off June 6 at Vincent G. Kennelley Park. The concerts, sponsored by the Fairport Public Library, are also free from 7-8 p.m. Thursdays.

2019 School Tax Collection

- collection will be mailed August 30.
- The first day of collection will begin Sept. 1 (Sept. 3 in office due to the weekend and holiday).
- If you do not have escrow and have not received your tax bill within the first week of September, please call our office at (585) 223-0770 or log on to www. monroecounty.gov to obtain a copy.
- The 1st installment is due to the Town by Sept. 16 (2nd and 3rd installments must be mailed directly to Monroe County).
- If you are paying in full, the full amount is due by Oct. 1.
- The Town will accept payments in the following ways:

- Tax bills for the upcoming 2019 School tax By check or cash in person at the Town Tax Office (Monday through Friday, 9 a.m.
 - By check via mail (receipt date determined by U.S. postmark only).
 - By check only in the Town Tax Dropbox located out front of the Town Hall (adhering to all tax due dates).
 - Credit card payments can only be made online at www.monroecounty.gov. Please be aware that a processing fee, equaling 3% of the total amount paid, will be charged by the credit card company when paying by credit card.

Wildlife Do's & Don'ts

DO call Animal Control immediately if you find a sick or injured animal. Animal Control will be able to assist in the safe capture of the animal and assess what further help the animal may need. (585) 223-5115 or after hours at (585) 425-7380 http://perinton.org/Departments/animal

DO contact Animal Control immediately if you see an aggressive coyote or fox. However, **Don't** be alarmed if you see one out during the day, many coyote and fox will leave the den to hunt during the day to compensate for the larger food supply needed to feed its family.

DO call a wildlife trapper if you find wildlife nesting in your attic or other areas of your house. Animal Control will not enter your house to remove wildlife.

DO use caution when driving at night. Automobile-related accidents are one of the main reasons for animal injuries and car damages.



 $oldsymbol{Don't}$ feed wildlife, this will make them lose their natural fear of humans and might cause problems with them in the future.

Don't feed pets outside. This will attract unwanted wildlife to the area and may cause conflicts between pets and wildlife.

Don't leave garbage on the ground or in open containers. Make sure all dumpsters are closed and locked when not in use. This will deter wildlife from entering them and making a mess or having a conflict with you or your pets.

 $oldsymbol{Don't}$ assume all baby animals that

are found alone need your assistance. Many wildlife such as deer and rabbits will leave their young alone for long periods during the day while they go off to forage for food.

Special note about ticks:

Ticks are on the rise in our area. They can carry many diseases that can be harmful to pets and humans.

Highway & Sewer Dept. News

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT - Road Program

The Highway Department construction season is in full swing. This year's road program includes nearly 6 miles of rehabilitation (milling and resurfacing), 21 miles of surface treatment (chip seal) and 50 miles of maintenance (crack filling). The work also includes replacement of 150 drainage inlets and hundreds of feet of gutter along with relining of several hundred feet of storm sewer. We have mailed letters to affected residents on the roads scheduled for construction. Information is also available on the Town's website.

We're also posting orange "construction ahead" signs at the entrances to affected neighborhoods and at the beginning of the construction work zones. Please slow down and use caution as you approach. Work zone safety is our number one concern during the construction season. The most dangerous job in a work zone is that of the flag person. Driver distractions result in more injuries and deaths in a work zone than any other factor. understand construction activities are disruptive and we do our best to minimize impacts to residents. However, you will likely encounter some brief traffic delays. We make every effort to minimize any inconveniences and get you on your way in a timely manner. Investing in our local roads keeps them safe, functional and enhances our overall community. We appreciate your patience and cooperation and thank you in advance for your understanding. Please note the Town is responsible for nearly 335 lane miles of roads in Perinton. There are an additional 70 lane miles of County roads and 63 lane miles of State roads in the Town. You can contact the Town Highway Department at (585) 223-5115, the Monroe County Department of Transportation at (585) 753-7750 and the New York State Department of Transportation at (585) 586-4514 with any questions you may have.

SEWER DEPARTMENT - Frequently Asked Ouestions

The Sewer Department operates and maintains nearly 210 miles of sanitary sewer mains and 29 pump stations, which serve nearly 19.000 residential and commercial/ industrial properties within the Town's Consolidated Sanitary Sewer District.

Is my property connected to the public sanitary sewer?

Not all properties in the Town have access Where sanitary to sanitary sewers. sewers are available, not all properties are connected. The best way to check if your property is or can be connected to the sanitary sewer system is to call the Sewer Department at (585) 223-5115.

What do I need to do to connect my property if it's not already connected?

If sanitary sewer is available and you wish to connect to it, you will need to contract with a local plumbing contractor perform the work. A Town building permit is required prior to connecting. Please contact the Code Enforcement & Development Department for more information at (585) 223-0770.

Who do I call for information regarding my individual septic system?

The Town of Perinton does not maintain septic system records. Please contact the

Monroe County Health Department at (585) 753-5050 for information about individual septic systems.

Who do I call if I am having trouble with my sanitary sewer (Ex., sewage backup into my home)?

Call the Sewer Department at (585) 223-5115 (normal business hours) or the Town's Emergency Answering Service at (585) 425-7360 (after hours and weekends). Our Crews are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for sewer related emergencies.

How do I find the location of the sanitary sewer lateral pipe that serves my home and property?

Contact the Sewer Department at (585) 223-5115. The Town maintains maps and records that provide general information on the type and location of these pipes that serve your property.

Is the sanitary sewer system different from the storm sewer system?

Yes. Sanitary sewers convey wastewater from homes and businesses to water resource recovery facilities for treatment before discharging into the environment. Town sewage is conveyed to and treated at Monroe County Pure Waters' Frank E. Van Lare Facility before it's discharged to Lake Ontario. Storm sewers convey rainwater and runoff from roads, gutters, drainage inlets, ponds and swales to natural drainage ways and water bodies in the Town.

Can my sump pump be connected to my sanitary sewer lateral pipe?

No, ground water must be discharged to the storm sewer system through a separate storm sewer lateral pipe.

Who do I call if I am having trouble with my storm sewer. (Ex., basement flooding in my home)?

Call the Sewer Department at (585) 223-5115 (normal business hours) or the Town's Emergency Answering Service at (585) 425-7360 (after hours and weekends), same as for sanitary sewers.

Does the Town locate underground utilities?

Yes, the Town works in conjunction with Dig Safely New York to locate Town sewers and utilities prior to any excavating. New York State law requires municipalities, utility companies, contractors and homeowners to call Dig Safely at 811 or (800) 962-7962 before excavating.

Who do I call if there is roadway floodina?

Call the Highway Department at (585) 223-5115 (normal business hours) or the Town's Emergency Answering Service at (585) 425-7360 (after hours and weekends), same as for sanitary or storm sewers.
